Training course for managers: gender & discrimination

OVERVIEW

Training for managers will provide key staff with information on gender-based violence, forms of sexual harassment, and how to address these issues in the workplace. Attendees will gain a broad understanding about Cambodia's commitments to eliminate violence against women as well as discussing practical approaches for developing a work environment with zero tolerance for sexual harassment and discrimination.

Two days of training allow for managers to gain a deeper understanding while also having the opportunity to plan for practical application of their knowledge.

KEY POINTS

- 2 days of training
- 25 – 30 participants per session
- Aimed at Human Resources, Administration & Compliance Managers
- Training provided by CARE Cambodia in collaboration with the Ministry of Women's Affairs.

TRAINING TOPICS

Day1: Overview; distinguishing sex and gender; ideal man, ideal woman and gender classification; gender-based violence and relevant laws; rebuilding the world.

Day 2: Forms of sexual harassment; what constitutes sexual harassment; the importance of preventing sexual harassment in the workplace; sexual harassment; policy development & enforcement; responding to cases of sexual harassment; developing action plans.

WHY TRAIN MANAGERS?

It is important for managers to understand the problems which might occur in the workplace.

Surveys show that people have some understanding of what behavior is sexual harassment, but there is not a clear understanding of which behaviors are against the law or why all sexual harassment is inappropriate and offensive .

Gaining a good understanding is the first step towards developing an effective policy for preventing sexual harassment from occurring.
